GOOD NEWS

South Carolina Senate rejects congressional map redraw. In South Carolina, the state Senate wrapped up its session on May 27 without voting on a new congressional map that would have dismantled the state's only majority-Black district. They quietly defied pressure from the president and the GOP to join the ongoing redistricting battle ahead of the midterm elections.

Slush fund slashed after backlash. The Justice Department has canceled plans to create a [\\$1.8 \(1.776\) billion "anti-weaponization fund"](#) that critics feared would have gone to loyalists of President Donald Trump.

On June 2, Acting Attorney General Todd Blanche testified that the DOJ would not move forward with plans for the fund, which was intended to compensate people who claimed to have been targeted by the "weaponization" of President Joe Biden's government. Backlash from some Republicans threatened to weaken the party's advantages. They and Democrats were concerned that it would serve as a "slush fund" for Trump's allies and supporters, including those who participated in the Jan. 6, 2021, attack on the Capitol.

Legal experts also [said](#) the fund lacked a clear legal basis, with no judicial review or congressional oversight. Blanche said they still plan to protect the president from investigations.

House votes to rein in Trump on Iran war, in a bipartisan rebuke. The House of Representatives has approved legislation seeking to end President Trump's war on Iran. On June 3, four Republican congress members broke ranks and sided with Democrats in a vote of **215-208** on a war powers resolution directing President Trump to remove U.S. armed forces from hostilities against Iran unless explicitly authorized by Congress. It adds to the pressure on the White House to find an end to the Iran War; as petrol prices have spiked and public opposition to the war has increased.

Protests swell against planned ICE detention centers. The Trump administration's plans to add at least 24 new facilities have triggered furious pushback in communities nationwide. Protests against existing and planned detention facilities have been held in, Burlington MA, Merrimack NH, Chester NY, Roxbury NJ, Hagerstown MD, Moshannon Valley PA, Ashland VA, Richmond VA, Conyers GA, Social Circle GA, Marietta GA, Hutchins TX, Socorro TX, Dilley TX, Durant OK, Oklahoma City OK, Kansas City MO, McHenry IL, Las Cruces NM, Salt Lake City UT, and others.

Some of the sites the agency is scouting are warehouses previously designed for e-commerce retailers. Of the already purchased warehouses that ICE planned to use for large scale detention space, none is functioning.

They have drawn significant pushback not only from outraged citizens, but also from elected officials who have stopped some purchase plans.

Legal challenges have stopped others. An environmental policy focused lawsuit is halting work in Hagerstown, Maryland. A potential multi-thousand-bed warehouse facility in Surprise, Arizona had a "stop work order" issued on its renovation project just days before.

In February, following a robust grassroots campaign joined by town officials, then by the New Hampshire congressional delegation and finally by Republican Governor Kelly Ayotte, DHS, decided not to move forward with the proposed ICE facility in nearby Merrimack, NH.

At Social Circle GA, City Manager Eric Taylor shut off the water to the warehouse, and declared that “the lock stays there ...until we had a better understanding of what the impact was going to be on our water.” In mid-May the town had filed for a federal lawsuit opposing the detention facility. Other than the concerns about water and sewer system problems, the complaint asserted that locating what ICE has called a “megacenter” in the small town of about 5,000 residents would violate Georgia’s “public nuisance” law – meaning it would “harm their health, safety, and wellbeing”. Legal experts said that this federal lawsuit has the potential to create a wide impact, as it uses novel legal arguments.

And New Jersey’s attorney general on June 2 filed a lawsuit against the private prison company GEO Group operating the ICE jail known as Delaney Hall. The lawsuit alleges GEO Group violated state law by blocking inspectors from the facility’s medical unit, sleeping quarters and bathing areas during a visit the previous week. This came as hundreds of immigrants detained at the ICE jail were continuing their hunger and labor strikes.

10,000 rulings: The courts' overwhelming rebuke of Trump's ICE policies. A POLITICO analysis reveals judges have ruled against ICE detention practices in roughly 90 percent of cases since the agency mandated that millions of immigrants must be locked up while they face deportation proceedings.

More than 10,000 times, judges have said those detentions, typically carried out with no opportunity for detainees to plead their case, were illegal. — a staggering rejection of a core piece of Trump’s immigration agenda.

Cases include [a nursing mother](#) who was detained despite active refugee status and another mother [separated from her one-year-old child](#) and released from custody only when her son landed in the hospital. Cases include [parents of U.S. military](#) service members, [trafficking victims or witnesses](#), and a [5-year-old boy](#) detained by ICE on his way home from school.

“This isn’t how things are supposed to work in America,” [wrote U.S. District Judge Gary Brown](#), a Trump appointee based in New York, in the case of a man whose lawful status was revoked after ICE arrested him. “Unquestionably, the laws of human decency condemn such villainy.”

New York Federal judge bans ICE arrests at Manhattan immigration courts. A federal judge in New York has banned ICE agents from arresting immigrants in or around three federal courthouses in lower Manhattan. Under the order issued by US district judge Kevin Castell, federal agents are no longer allowed to make arrests of immigrants except under exceptional circumstances at the sites where hearings are held before immigration judges.

The ruling came in response to a lawsuit brought by the New York Civil Liberties Union, the American Civil Liberties Union, Make the Road NY, and other groups.

Democratic district attorneys vow to prosecute federal agents who target voting sites. A nationwide coalition of Democrat district attorneys and prosecutors has vowed to prosecute any federal agent suspected of intimidating voters. “A federal badge is not a license to violate the Constitution, and it is not a shield from state criminal law,” said Larry Krasner, district attorney of Philadelphia. “We will prosecute ICE agents who break the law. There is no category of American who gets to operate above it.”

Members of the coalition, which calls itself the Project for the Fight Against Federal Overreach, warned the administration that any federal agents sent to polling

places within their jurisdictions will be prosecuted.

Federal prosecutors drop all charges against the "Broadview Six". In late May, federal prosecutors in Chicago have dismissed all charges against the four remaining members of the so-called "[Broadview Six](#)," a group of protesters who were arrested outside the ICE facility in Broadview last fall. They were later indicted for conspiracy to impede a federal agent, despite many not having met prior to appearing together in court. “I didn’t find out that I had been indicted until a month after this happened,” says Kat Abughazaleh, who was not arrested at the protest, but weeks later, as she was running for Congress.

Defense attorneys said prosecutors were forced to drop the case because of "significant errors" in the grand jury process. A [trial](#) that had been scheduled to begin next week was canceled, after prosecutors agreed to dismiss the charges with prejudice, meaning they cannot be refiled.

Federal Judge in Tennessee dismisses all criminal charges against Kilmar Abrego Garcia, the Maryland father of three who was wrongfully sent to El Salvador's notorious CECOT mega-prison last year. After Abrego Garcia won his deportation case, the Justice Department attempted to bring human smuggling charges against him, stemming from a 2022 traffic stop in Tennessee. But on May 26, U.S. District Judge Waverly Crenshaw ruled that actions taken by then-Deputy Attorney General Todd Blanche had "tainted" the investigation with a "vindictive motive". Judge Crenshaw added: "The evidence before this Court sadly reflects an abuse of prosecuting power."

The grid is in better shape this summer thanks to solar energy and batteries. We expect another abnormally hot summer, but the U.S. grid appears to be in decent shape to handle the heat thanks to a rapid expansion of solar generation and energy storage. This is the conclusion of the new summer reliability assessment from the North American Electric Reliability Corp.(NERC), which oversees the U.S. and Canadian electric systems.

“Record resource additions have strengthened readiness for the summer season,” [NERC highlighted](#), including “a substantial influx of solar and battery” resources , the [most prevalent and lowest-cost new sources](#) of grid power (18% of this growth is new natural gas-fired generators.”) The report contradicts the Trump administration’s claims that aging classic fossil-fueled plants are needed in order to prevent blackouts.

Masood was at two protests in Boston, one organized by Jewish Voice for Peace and one by Doctors Against Genocide. Carolyn reported on the protests at the ICE facility in Burlington.

Boryana reported a new protest in Lawrence, at the bridge near the New Balance outlet, in support of immigrants, held every Thursday from 5pm to 6pm (Now 4 to 5).

At the end of the meeting we had a free conversation about the situation in the country, expected problems with vaccines, the unwillingness of the Democratic Party to change, and much more.

Many of us signed individually a petition to award the Nobel Peace Prize to the people of Minneapolis for their peaceful resistance to ICE.

Michael sent a reply to the invitation to the November Stone Soup Supper that he couldn't attend because he was in the hospital.

Turned out, he was at Boston Medical Center Brighton (the former St. Elizabeth's) in their ICU, with pneumonia and other problems. He died December 6.

Michael was an enthusiastic MVPP member for at least 20 years. He was well read, a thinker, and he wrote so many letters to the editor, that our web page pointed to his, to keep readers up to date. He contributed at meetings, and sometimes gently challenged where we were going. He knew when to add a corny joke.

He often sat at our tables until he got involved with a similar cause – to overrule Citizens United, where the Supreme Court said money was protected as free speech, so giant corporate donations could sponsor politicians. Then he would be at his own table for that cause, [We the People](#).

He attended four No Kings marches before he was bedridden.

Jane Cadarette, Peace Activist Remembered

I met Jane in 1983 or 1984. I believe she was a member of the Greater Lawrence Ecumenical Freeze Group, a group of anti-nuclear activists from



various Christian churches in the greater Lawrence area that was organized by Rev. Jim Keller to promote a nuclear freeze, where the US and Soviet Union would freeze the size of their nuclear arsenals. The group met in Lawrence and included long-time MVPP members Arthur Brien, Dick McCarthy, and me. In 1984, Jim Keller moved his ministry and the Freeze Group disbanded.

At the same time, the North Andover People for Peace was being organized at the North Parish Unitarian Church in North Andover. I believe Arthur, Dick, Jane, and I all joined immediately and jumped into the effort to incorporate the group and apply for 501(c)(3) status. Jane became one of the founding officers.

Jane, like many of us, was deeply inspired by Dr. Helen Caldicott. Dr. Caldicott believed nuclear weapons and the US-Soviet strategy of mutually assured destruction presented an existential threat to all humanity. Jane also feared nuclear power and the potential release of radiation from Seabrook nuclear power plant. She kept potassium iodide pills to counteract radiation sickness in her home.

Jane was also a devout Catholic who believed in the sanctity of humanity and all creation. Her faith in God's good creation and her fear that arrogant and ignorant humans could destroy it in seconds with nuclear weapons motivated her towards grassroots education of her fellow citizens through North Andover People for Peace, later Merrimack Valley People for Peace, as well as other organizations. Her role was to spread the message that humans and their faith leaders needed to wake up and address nuclear weapons/nuclear power before a catastrophe.

This she did with almost boundless energy, optimism, and gentle humor.

One of the most powerful educational tools she discovered in this effort was Beyond War. Jane and her husband joined Beyond War in the mid-1980s and organized home presentations to which they would invite neighbors, friends, and anyone they could interest.

Some of the early projects I recall working with Jane on were a lecture by Dr. Benjamin Spock and a Peace Walk. We also managed to organize a lecture by Dr. Helen Caldicott. Jane put her all into each project and I recall feeling we could not fail with her on our team. Later I recall all of her effort to organize a Beyond War peace prize "Spacebridge" satellite simulcast at Merrimack College, as host to a community television program on peace, and host to visiting Japanese Hibakusha (survivors of Hiroshima and Nagasaki). She also helped to organize a local peace activist lecture at her church, St. Michael's and hosted movie nights for MVPP members to see independent peace films in her home.

But that wasn't even the half of it. Jane was a prolific writer. Her daughters have a scrapbook of dozens of her newspaper articles promoting peace assembled

over decades. Jane was a very good writer and connected well with her audience.

Jane continued her involvement with North Andover People for Peace/Merrimack Valley People for Peace for roughly 30-35 years despite several health setbacks. She was a true inspiration and friend. Merrimack Valley People for Peace can attribute many of our successes to her vision, energy, and organization.
